The Study Window

In an Alban Institute article, Dominique Gillard suggests that, "In an age of nonstop media that exposes us as never before to the world's pain and brokenness, lamentation is an essential and even revolutionary act, one that the church needs desperately to reclaim. Scripture suggests that lamentation is a liturgical act that reorients and transforms us. Lamentation is uncensored communion with God. It is worship where we learn to be honest, intimate and humble before God. Lamentation is both an acknowledgment that things are not as they should be and an anguished wail, beckoning the Lord to intervene with righteousness and justice.

Gillard suggests that we are bombarded by an unprecedented, unceasing stream of media that exposes us to the world's pain and brokenness as never before. Before we truly grieve one tragedy, another occurs and we move on before we can process what has occurred. Lamentation, however, forces us to slow down. In the midst of daily tragedy, lamentation requires us to stay engaged after the cameras and publicity move on. It summons us to immerse ourselves in the pain and despair of the world, of our communities, of our own sinfulness.

We need to lament because, paradoxically, often the best way to cure pain is to engage it. Lamentation prevents us from becoming numb and apathetic to the pain of our world and those around us. Lamentation opens our eyes to the injustice and oppression we had not even noticed. To live without lament is to live an unexamined life.

Lamentation requires four steps: remembrance, reflection, confession and repentance.

The first step, always, is to remember. God repeatedly instructed Israel to remember that they were once slaves, foreigners and exiles. This remembrance is to shape their life as God's people and is the linchpin of their faithfulness. When Israel forgot, they turned from God, became self-centered, practiced idolatry and enacted injustice.


A faith devoid of lamentation aborts history and forsakes remembrance. This is the predicament we find ourselves in today. One of the primary failures of modern Christianity is its historical nature. History summons us as Christians to confess, lament and repent of our role in and apathy toward our nation's record of injustice and exploitation. From the days of Pharaoh and Caesar right down to today, history and Scripture reveal that oppression is always institutionalized and structural. The sinful manifestations of a hardened heart have never been confined to interpersonal interactions. Too often, the hardened heart of an entire people is expressed collectively through institutions, organizations, governments -- and even the church.

Institutional injustice is part of our nation's history. As a church, we have failed to confess and lament this reality. Too often, we have conformed to the pattern of this world and have not been transformed by the renewing of our minds. Consequently, we have become as prone as anyone else to engage in segregation, discrimination and oppression. The injustices of racism, sexism, classism, mass incarceration and militarism are all consequences of our failure to live in remembrance and lamentation.

History, however, roots us in humility; remembrance compels us to lament. In lamentation, we acknowledge that sin has distorted our relationship with God, our neighbors and creation. Lament beckons us to discern how we can recalibrate our relating in light of the gospel. When faithfully engaged and authentically enacted, lamentation keeps us accountable to our baptismal vows. It reminds us of our need for God, one another and the Holy Spirit's guidance. Lamentation is a form of centering prayer that shapes our discipleship and mission; it illuminates blind spots in our lives and ministry, helping us to make our discipleship faithful and effective."



Even though we come from different traditions, we are all the children of God. The Unity Build idea is that it is very important that people of all faiths in this city demonstrate their unity though common service, and building a home is a perfect way to do so. Through laying a strong foundation—spiritual and physical—we can play an integral role in building hope in the city of New Orleans.

Where is the build?

The site is at 6500 Dorian St., in New Orleans. It is in the western most part of New Orleans East.

I want to help! What's involved?

Construction Jobs:

- A schedule of work has been created. You can sign up for the day they are doing work you want to do.
- A work-day is 8 am to about 4 pm, and includes lunch and snack breaks. You are expected to stay the whole day.
- You will check in at 7:45 am and receive a safety review and assignment to your task for the day. The Habitat for Humanity workers will be there to guide you through every step of the process and expectations.
- All of the tools you will need and safety gear you will need are there for you.
- All of the supplies needed to do the job are already on site and waiting for you.
- All construction volunteers must be at least 16 years old. Those under 18 must be accompanied by an adult.
- You will get a reminder before your scheduled date.
- Sign up early before the space is gone!

Week 1 - October 5 thru 8:

Framing Walls; Sheathing Vertical Walls; Installing Trusses; Installing Windows and Exterior doors; Blueboard and Housewrap; Deck Roof and Tarpaper; Shingles

<u>Week 2 – October 12 thru 14:</u> Siding Installation; Interior/Exterior Paint; F Channel

<u>Week 3 – October 19 thru 21:</u> Interior Floor Installation; Interior Trim; Porch Work; Installation of Soffit and Fascia

Week 4 - October 26 thru 28:



Laying Sod; Installing Fence; Touch-up Paint; Installing Door Hardware; Cleaning

I want to help! What's involved?

Not Construction Jobs:

- There are several non-construction jobs that are needed:
 - Registration and Check-In: Work time is 7:15 thru about 8:15 am. You sit at a table and guide workers to sign in and to sign their waiver form. Several people are needed each day. Sign up with a friend!
 - Leading Morning Prayer/Devotion: Task occurs at 8 am and takes 5 minutes.



- o Snack Provider:
 - There are 2 shifts, morning and afternoon. Sign up for one or both as you like. There is no set time. The workers do not have a formal break time, they will come and go as they need to. Come when you are ready and stay to visit others or leave as you wish.
 - You will bring the snacks that the church or Playschool has collected, and set them out on the table provided.
 - There are a few chairs so you can sit and visit.
- Lunch Provider:
 - Lunch is from 11:30 to 12:30. You will need to have lunch set up by 11:30 and then clean up when lunch is done.
 - As a church, we will make the lunch, deliver the lunch, setup the lunch and clean it all up. We can separate the jobs or do it all together. Plan for 50 hungry people!
 - There is no place for the workers to sit down unless they bring their own chairs or blankets, so make sure your lunch can be eaten standing up. There are 2 tables for setting out the lunch.
 - You will need to provide any utensils and cups needed to consume your lunch, plus napkins.
 - JCPC needs to try to provide lunch at least twice.
- There are jobs outside of the actual on site work (see Sharon Fortin)
- There are activities for young people under the age of 16 (see Julie Hebert).



Box Tops for Education are found on many, many common products: General Mills Cereals; Ziploc Products; Progresso Soups; Betty Crocker items; Old El Paso items; Scott and Kleenex products; Land O'Lakes, Pillsbury, and Yoplait products; Nature Valley and Fiber One products; and Hefty products. Each labels is worth 10 cents.

Campbell's Labels can be found on Campbell's soup and sauce cans; Pepperage Farm products; Pace salsas and sauces; Swanson stocks and chicken cans; V8 products; and SpaghettO products. These are used for purchase sports items from a catalog.





Local Community Coffee labels are being collected as well. The UPC Proof of Purchase Seal is what counts for these. Any Community Coffee product has one. We are collecting the seal off of the cases of coffee we are purchasing for Sunday coffee! Each one is worth 10 cents!
