

From Reverend Ochart

On January 6, 2021, armed insurgents invaded the Capital Building in Washington DC. As the Nation watched in shock, an angry mob forced their way into the 'People's House' while the Senate and House of Representatives were meeting to certify the results of the 2020 presidential election. Several of the invaders carried loaded weapons and zip ties with the apparent intent to hold members of Congress hostage. At this point, five people have lost their lives as a result of this appalling act and countless others were injured. Several of those involved in the mob have been arrested or lost their jobs as a result of taking part in the "protest". Several within and outside the government are calling for a second Impeachment of President Donald Trump for his calling and inciting the mob at a political rally beforehand, and a handful of staffers have stepped down over his actions during or since. The President has since conceded the election, pledged a peaceful transition of power, and condemned those who took part in the assault.

It is a shocking and humbling end (hopefully) to the craziness of the last several months. I think what is so challenging about it is that it reveals just how deeply divided we are as a country. These insurgents were not from another country, but American Citizens. The fact that we are divided as a country should not be news to any of us, but just how deeply those divisions go is. The hard truth is that we did not get here overnight, and the inauguration of a new President or the charging of a few criminals will not magically make everything better. Those who perpetrated this attack, and those who sympathize with it are our friends, our family, our neighbors, maybe even we ourselves.

Our history as the Church, including the Reformed Tradition, has at many times been a deeply divided one. The early church saw divisions between Jewish believers and Gentile believers, and divisions within those groups. The history of the Protestant Reformation was the playing out of deep theological divisions between the Medieval Roman Catholic Church and the emerging protestant bodies; and also between Lutherins, Reformed folks, Ana-Baptists, etc. Our own history of the Presbyterian movement in the United States has also seen divisions and splits. In 1837, decades before the American Civil War, Presbyterians separated over theological differences around the slavery question, creating the "Old School" and "New School" within the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. When the Civil War started, the southern Old School Presbyterians created a new and separate body, the Presbyterian Church in the Confederate States of America. After the war, the northern Presbyterians (Presbyterian Church in the United States) did not reunite, but operated as two separate bodies for one hundred and twenty years.

However, The Christian and Presbyterian story is one of redemption and reconciliation as well. In 1983, after a long process of conversation and overtures from each General Assembly, the northern and southern bodies came back together under the Plan of Union to form the Presbyterian Church (USA). They sighted that "We see this union as one step toward fulfillment of our Lord's prayer that his followers "may be perfectly one, so that the world may know..." (John 17:23)." While the creation of the PC(USA) was by no means perfect, and we certainly still deal with theological and political disagreements as Presbyterians, the message remains that reconciliation is possible between people and organizations.

Additionally, the most recent addition to our Book of Confession, the Confession of Belhar, makes the bold statement that "unity is, therefore, both a gift and an obligation for the Church of Jesus Christ; that through the working of God's Spirit it is a binding force, yet simultaneously a reality which must be earnestly pursued and sought: one which the people of God must continually build up to attain." A statement made bolder upon reflecting that it was written during and in response to Apartheid in South Africa.

Yes, we are deeply divided as a country. There are so many things that we differ on, and it feels like less and less that we have in common. Social Media companies and other Media organizations thrive off of our hate for one another and profit from our radicalization; Political, corporate, and cultural leaders manipulate us for their own power and purposes; and our own sense of belonging and desire for control feeds into our clinging to one side and refuting the other.

But the unity of the Spirit of Christ is far more powerful than anything else that the powers of this world can throw at us. In the words of Paul, "I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38-39) This is not something that we can face on our own, but it is something that God can do in and through us. Pain and violence is not the answer to pain and violence; love is, faith is, hope is. We do need to hold one another, and especially our leaders, to account for their actions, but the purpose of discipline should always be growth and reconciliation.

I do not know where these events will lead. I pray that it will be to a peaceful end (but I know enough about history to know that is not the only option, at least in the short-term). I do know, however, that our call as the disciples of and the body of Christ has not changed. Our sacred duty to earnestly seek and pursue unity remains.

Oh God of grace and truth. Give us your peace that passes all understanding, and the courage to be your hands and feet. Be with our nation, her leaders, and her people in these trying times. May your Spirit work through us all to know and to do your will for our lives. Amen.




FLOWER CHART 2021:
